



THE VISAGE VIRTUOSO

Your dress is stunning, your hair is divine...but it's all for naught without the linchpin of bridal beautification: your makeup. Becoming the picture of perfection means getting some face time with a true professional.

Your wedding day is not (we repeat: not) the time to call in your sister's best friend's cousin to do your makeup. Unless, of course, she just so happens to be an award-winning makeup artist like Dani Wagener Braho (who got married this past March). In her 15 years in the beauty industry, Braho has gained national recognition and become one of the area's most-soughtafter face-makers. When she's not doing high-profile editorial photo shoots, working with celebs, or giving one-on-one technique lessons, she wields her brush to make some magic happen for brides-to-be.

What's the best way to find a makeup artist?

Word of mouth. Don't just rely on blogs. When I get new bridal clients I have them come in, meet me, and have their makeup done for another occasion. I make them up for a night out, for their engagement party, or for their bridal shower. That way they get to try it. If they leave loving it, then they trust what I do and feel comfortable with me. Then we don't have to figure out exactly what we're going to do the day of. >>

So you don't subscribe to the idea of multiple wedding-day makeup trials?

I think 9 out of 10 brides wake up on their wedding day feeling a certain way, and it's not how they felt a year ago. A lot of brides decide they want to go a little bit more glam that day. Skin tones change from fall to winter and colors can look different, so I don't think it's about figuring out exactly what you're going to look like. It's about finding the person you trust to get you to where you want to be on that day. But I'll do as many trials as a client wants.

What's the most important element of face-making?

Balance. There needs to be an appropriate balance of color throughout. I don't think you can say, "I want to just focus on my eyes"—that doesn't mean we won't do cheek or lip color. >>







My chair is set up several feet away from the mirror so people can see the balance of their makeup, not what their face looks like from two inches away.

What do you focus on for brides who prefer to go au naturel?

For a very natural look, it's all about the details. I've had brides who have literally worn almost nothing. It's about the lash line; it's about the skin being flawless and making their features stand out. There's a big misconception that you need to wear a ton of makeup in order to look good. It's true that if I put a little more makeup on, you might look fresher in your photos, but it's more about what makes you feel comfortable.

Airbrushing has become popular over the past few years. Is it the best option?

I think it is. It's flawless. I like to do a custom-blended foundation, and you can't achieve that with just one bottle. That's what first drew me to airbrushing, because it allows me to customize color on the spot. The other benefit is that it has a tiny bit of silicone in it, so it sits more on the surface of the skin and doesn't leave a cakey look. It's the best thing to cover acne. It helps absorb oil as the day goes on, and it just doesn't budge. I've had brides in 90-degree weather whose makeup looked the same at midnight.

Should the rest of the bridal party have their makeup done?

It always comes down to budget.
Usually I tell people to worry about themselves and a core group of people—like Mom, the maid of honor, and a sister. It can be less chaotic that way, as well. My maximum is six people, because I don't like anybody to feel rushed. If there are more than six, I bring another artist with me. Smaller groups eliminate some of the chaos.

When do you think it's right to go for bold colors in bridal makeup?

If it's something you're already comfortable with. If you already rock red lips and people have seen you in a red lip, then go for it. But if you've never worn a red lip in your life, don't do it on your wedding day.

them, we can make recommendations based on style and budget, and provide vendors that are very well trusted, reputable, and talented at what they do.

Where did the inspiration for the lounge come from?

EG: Most wedding industry professionals will tell you that the majority of their business comes from word-of-mouth referrals, so we thought a business model that uses genuine recommendations and referrals to connect couples with vendors was a solid plan.

KB: I flew out to L.A. to visit a business with a similar concept, and we adjusted what they were doing to what



KB: After being in the business for so many years, I know a lot of the bigger names in the industry. But what we wanted was to have a wide variety of people, so we look at their >>









websites, view samples of their work, ask for referrals from other industry professionals that are well respected. and use reviews that brides and grooms have written and posted online.

How does BBL help with the planning process?

KB: A lot of people don't know where to begin. We bring it back to talking about where you are, step by step. Sometimes it takes an expert in the field to bring couples back to that mindset, bring a smile to their faces, and let them realize that it's okay.

EG: Essentially we're trying to find a vendor that matches their personalities and style.

Your jobs seem to be equal parts concierge and matchmaker. How do you pair clients with vendors?

KB: We look for a lot of key words. We had a couple who came in wanting to "honor local." They live over in the Seaport and love their neighborhood. We recommended the Epicenter as a venue, and we recommended Chive catering-because they pull all their food from local farms-and the bride and groom loved it.

Where do you suggest brides start with their planning?

KB: You want to decide what wedding style you'd like, what your guest list will look like, the time of year you want to get married, your budget, and how you want to celebrate with your guests. Then start researching venues and vendors.

What can be left for later?

KB: Spa treatments! Treat yourself. Right before the wedding you should honestly be pampering yourself. Don't leave any of the heavy load for a couple of weeks before. Just tie up loose ends and enjoy it.

Even with all the help, a bride-to-be can still get anxious. Do you have a go-to mantra to help prevent spiraling?

KB: "Take it one step at a time." When you try to do everything at once, it's too much. But if you take it piece by piece and have a timeline and a budget in your head, it's much more manageable.

THE DANCE DOCTORS

Your first-ever romantic turn on the floor might have been awkward, but with a little practice, your first one as a married couple doesn't have to be.

For some folks, dancing is pure fun. For others, it's an anxiety-inducing prospect. Wherever you fall on that spectrum, if a wedding dance is in your near future, lessons should be, too. Hundreds of couples have turned to Arthur Murray Dance Studios owner Mark Lightner and instructor Kia Kenney for help preparing for their first dance as husband and wife. These two know what it takes to get the most shine out of your time in the spotlight-and are more than happy to get you ready for the spin of a lifetime. A.E.M.

What is your studio's teaching style?

MARK LIGHTNER: The most unique thing about our curriculum is probably the three phases. First, there's no preset schedule. Our students pick the intensity and the amount of repetition based on their availability and their passion for dancing. Second, we teach everything based on a predetermined syllabus that allows us to be a lot more efficient. Finally, we have a national board that constantly updates our lessons with new information, so when dance styles become popular, you get that syllabus delivered to you, ready to go. >>




What dance styles are popular these days? Are we all still doing the waltz?

ML: We'll always see traditional, but we've seen amazing creativity. One thing that's brought us a lot of information is YouTube. Students walk in and say, "Here's what I want to do at my wedding. How do I learn that kind of thing?" KIA KENNEY: Salsa is popular if they have a destination wedding. We've done Latin medleys for people. We also get a lot of requests for swing from those who want something more lively. We try to tailor it around the music, because the song usually has some meaning.

Are there any dances that are klutzproof?

ML: There are definitely dances that are easier than others. Some are less complicated in basic rhythm, and we pride ourselves on making adjustments. A lot of it depends on how much time you want to spend training. And what we find out is that often a couple's desire for the finished product and their commitment to learn aren't always in balance, and that's an important consideration. >>









What do you find is more successful: memorizing choreography, or learning some steps to the rhythm of your song and then freestyling?

KK: If someone wants a choreographed dance, we certainly will deliver that. But if you can spend the time to actually learn how to dance, then you have ownership of what you're doing. If you have to map out and learn choreographed steps to every beat of the music, that's one more thing to think about. And it can sometimes detract from the partnership aspect, which is what makes watching a dance so enjoyable.

So why take classes? Theoretically, the couple could just stand there and waddle back and forth for three minutes.

ML: Your first dance is such a highlight; when you watch it after the fact and realize you did the high school sway out there and were capable of more, that's kind of disappointing. I think there are a lot of couples that have a go-forit attitude and decide to make it something special. Most important, wedding planning can get hectic, and often the dance lessons are one of the few times that they can really focus on each other.

How long should the first dance be?

ML: Two minutes is a really great time frame. We often give couples a grouping that they'll repeat. Most of our pros will have a minute of choreography and loop; that's a really good idea for our students, as well.


How much can a bride and groom expect to spend on dance lessons?

KK: Most couples' lessons range from \$600 to \$1,500 if they want to go all out on a longer program that encompasses a great first dance and also the ability to dance throughout the whole reception to a variety of music.

Any thoughts for a dance-wary groom-to-be?

KK: I had a groom tell me once that the only guy who doesn't want to dance is the guy who doesn't know how. So it's just fun to watch them learn and have more fun than they ever imagined.

RIAITO

At this beloved Cambridge restaurant, couples can celebrate with an intimate Italian dinner party on the heated, vine-wrapped terrace, opened just last summer. The space, which holds 40 people for a seated dinner (more for cocktail receptions) under a twinkling awning, has already become popular for smaller weddings. As for the food? Recent selections on the customizable prix-fixe menu have included Macomber turnip soup, Venetian duck pâté on bulgur crackers, and butter-poached lobster, making this a unique choice for lovebirds in search of a venue with exceptional cuisine. The much-respected Boston-based Longwood Events purchased this waterfront property in Harwich Port, Cape Cod, last year and set about restoring it in a style the company calls "Ralph Lauren meets Cape Cod"—which means you can expect plenty of preppy navy blues, ivories, and beiges set against breathtaking vistas. Outdoor ceremonies can be held on manicured grounds overlooking Harwich Harbor, while inside, the stately Harbor Room accommodates up to 300 guests—who afterward can spill out onto white sand for a seaside reception. The venue also benefits from Longwood's signature flexibility; planners fulfill special requests of every kind, from photo booths to clambakes. MUSEUM OF FINE ARTS

Big news: The MFA now hosts weddings. Its crown jewel is the spectacular glass-walled Shapiro Family Courtyard, a soaring 12,000-plus-square-foot stunner designed by famed London architects Foster + Partners. Elsewhere on the property, the Koch Gallery, lined with 17th- and 18th-century European paintings, provides a regal backdrop for smaller weddings. Restaurant Associates—which serves up food at celebrations in other landmark museums, including the MET—provides the catering. And as a bonus, attendees can view the galleries, including the new Arts of the Americas wing. MANDARIN ORIENTAL BOSTON

The soul of this swanky Back Bay hotel is its only outdoor space (also known as the "sitting grove"), which now accommodates ceremonies spring through fall. Here guests can take in lush greenery—tangles of wild ginger, red peonies, and Oriental poppies—along with the bride and groom's vows. Relaxation is a cinch at this Relais & Château property, which boasts two private beaches opposite the Atlantic and Nantucket Bay, lawn chairs on sprawling green grass, and couples' massages. When you've had your fill, take off and go fishing, bird-watching, kayaking, golfing, or shopping in the area (though the hotel is nine miles from Nantucket Town, regular jitney service is offered). But with thoughtful extras such as bedtime sweets, turndown service, and port and cheese tastings, why would you ever want to leave?






CASTLE HILL RESORT AND SPA

WATCH HILL, RHODE ISLAND

Spending two weeks in Hawaii isn't the only way to get a taste of paradise: Those looking for a seaside getaway with plenty of pampering can also find it at the Ocean House. The 19th-century hotel's bygone beauty has recently been brought back to life—more than 5,000 artifacts were re-created or reused, including Victorian windows, doors, and chandeliers. 

You can't put a price on a sunset. But if you could, then a stay at the Beach Plum Inn would be an absolute steal. The retreat, located up-island on Menemsha Harbor, has just 11 rooms, most of which feature porches, decks, or patios perfect for watching the sun sink slowly into the horizon. This 18-cottage resort is the stuff of storybook beginnings. "We found businesses and products that reflected our environmentally and socially conscious lifestyle," she says.

The couple went even further by "[finding] paper products and stationery with the highest recycled content possible and [reducing] the number of paper items needed overall," she says. Instead of giving each guest a dinner menu, for example, each table had one to share. The bride and groom worked with local companies rather than big-box vendors to create the natural atmosphere they were looking for.

And even though the State Room is in a 33-story skyscraper, it has an organic feel to it, Emma explains, noting the hardwood floors, natural light, and amazing views of the city. "We considered getting married outside," she says. "But not in the middle of July in Boston!" JULIE SURATT






